FPSS Society continues to adapt to online training, find innovative ways to support caregivers, and hone our social media skills. The Board and Staff of FPSS look forward to the opportunity to reimagine service delivery that combines the best of virtual and in-person events. FPSS has offered replays of virtual workshops for those who were unable to attend the live session. Caregivers express appreciation for the opportunity to access training at times that fit their schedules.

Coordinators and the Regional Office staff continue to be proactive in distributing links to current, accurate information to caregivers and letting them know they can reach out for support or information in whatever way they feel most comfortable. Information we share includes resources, reminders of upcoming training, Ministry updates and notices as well as information from BCFPA. Coordinators make a special effort to stay in touch with caregivers who are not on email distribution lists and/or require extra support. In smaller communities, coordinators often communicate primarily through text and phone to accommodate local preferences.

The return to in-person meetings and training continues to be challenging. While some caregivers are anxious to return to this format, others now prefer to attend via online platforms. Online delivery allows caregivers in remote communities across Vancouver Island to participate in training they would not otherwise have access to. In-person events provide a level of connection and communication not experienced through a computer screen. FPSS will continue to consciously seek a balance that provides accessible, quality services caregivers have come to expect with opportunities for real-time, in-person connections.

FPSS Society has experienced staff shortages due to a number of factors which resulted in staff members being on medical leave. Remaining staff prioritized ensuring that there was no interruption of support, training, or other services provided to caregivers. As a result, reporting for this quarter is incomplete. Information and statistics included have been compiled to the best of our ability.

Section 1: Enhanced Communication among Caregivers

- Peer Support Groups:** These groups continue to be a source of communication, networking, and support services for the foster caregivers throughout the Region. Some areas prefer to use a workshop format rather than a coffee party format, while other areas employ both. Support group meetings may include an educational component; or offer a more social approach. In response to COVID-19, these meetings moved on-line or to outdoor venues where physical distancing is possible. We are now increasingly using hybrid modules where on-line and in-person gatherings merge. FPSS uses Owl Conference Camera in the Regional Office to offer this hybrid service and the Teams or Zoom platforms in other areas.
- Partnership, Education Advisory and/or Retention Committees:** Local Councils and foster caregiver groups continue to meet with MCFD and community agencies for joint discussion around foster caregiving, on-going training, ministry changes and policies, issues, and concerns. These meetings bear different appellations in each area such as Advisory Committee, Partnership Meetings, Joint-Training Planning meetings, but perform the same function – allowing foster caregivers to communicate with each other, with MCFD, and with Community Agencies. Efforts to return to fully in-person events continue to be met with mixed results.
- FPSS Society Regional Teleconferences:** These meetings afford foster caregivers from each area and/or Local Council an opportunity to meet with one another to discuss current issues, new policies, and trends. Each area reports which activities are successful in their area, and which are less so. Participants share ideas and suggestions.
- Regional Newsletter:** *The Island Connection* is a vital source of communication and information to the foster caregivers and MCFD in this Region. It is a cost effective, efficient way of distributing news and information to our fostering community. FPSS Society distributes the newsletter via (email and/or surface mail) to foster homes and MCFD/Delegated Agency offices, posts it on our website at <http://www.fpss.com>, and makes it available through our Regional office. Coordinators receive hard copies of the newsletters to hand out at meetings and events. We included our Toll-Free number in the printed and digital copies of our newsletters. New caregivers receive a copy in the Foster Caregiver Orientation Package.

- **Brochures, Posters, and Flyers:** We circulate these items through email, our offices, and our website. We have distributed copies of brochures to MCFD offices for display and distribution to caregivers. They illustrate our services; provide conference/forum/workshop details and registration information. FPSS Society distributes Foster Caregiver Orientation booklets to new foster caregivers that contains important information regarding services and resources available through the organization. The organization has a series of brochures for programs/topics including Safe Babies, Investigation and Resolution Support Program, Foster Parent Rights and Responsibilities, the FPSS Complaint Process, Mentor Program, and FPSS Society Commitment to Reconciliation. Local coordinators distribute event posters to open homes and community agencies in their area. FPSS provides notices, information, and opportunities for input on Facebook as well as our email distribution lists, website and newsletter.
- **Social Media:** The FPSS Society uses a range of social media platforms to communicate with stakeholders locally, provincially, and beyond. The organization updates the website on a regular basis and posts calendars of events for each region (South, Central, and Upper). Foster caregivers can download event calendars to their smartphone, home computers, or Yahoo and Google calendars. The Regional office uses *Constant Contact* to communicate with foster caregivers through regular emails regarding meetings, news, and upcoming events. Caregivers can also communicate with the FPSS Society through fpsss.com, Fosterhope.ca, Facebook, and X (Twitter). To offer caregivers another option for connecting and communicating with one another, FPSS Society created private Facebook Group pages for the communities that did not already have one in place. These pages are a way for caregivers to have immediate, confidential access to discussion, practical solutions, information, support, and answers to shared questions.

FPSS Society uses Facebook to post recruitment ads in communities throughout Vancouver Island. The ads target potential caregivers who can fulfill the specific needs of the community.
- **CASL Compliancy:** FPSS Society has guidelines and procedures required to ensure the organization is in compliance with the 2014 Canadian Anti-Spam legislation. CASL procedures include ensuring that foster caregivers providing their email are aware of who is making the request, what types of emails they can expect to receive from the FPSS Society, and that they may unsubscribe from an email distribution list at any time at no cost.

**Regional Mentor Program 2nd Quarter Activity Summary

Mentors are experienced foster parents who have received specialized training on how to mentor other foster parents. Mentors all over the island are available to connect with new foster parents as well as foster parents who may be struggling with isolation, standards of practice or needing some assistance to get out for training. The Mentor Program has momentum. The program has received five (5) Mentee referrals this quarter four (4) from Victoria and one (1) from Duncan. All Mentees have been matched with Mentors.

In August 2023, the Mentor program hosted a hybrid Meet and Greet with Mentor, Mentees and potential Mentors. It was well attended and comments after the meeting were positive. The Mentor Program is actively recruiting more Mentors for the upcoming training sessions with Ros Pringle. With the end of summer and staff returning to work, the Mentor Program is expecting an influx of Mentee referrals.

There were six Foster Hope Information Sessions between July 1st and September 30th, 2023. We continue to see participants from communities across Vancouver Island. As the Provincial MCFD Recruitment Team becomes more active, we are seeing an increasing number of participants from throughout the province at the sessions. MCFD staff attend Foster Hope Information Sessions to speak on behalf of the ministry. FPSS asks MCFD and agency staff members to attend a session as a participant/observer prior to attending to speak.

Following each Foster Hope Information Session, the Recruitment Coordinator sends an email to those who attended asking if they would like to take the next step and request a Foster Caregiver Application Package. Participants can choose between a digital or hard copy, and specify whether they require a one-person or a multi-person application. The coordinator sends an email to those who registered but did not attend, providing registration links to upcoming sessions. Often participants who miss a session will register for another on a later date. The coordinator forwards requests for foster caregiver applications packages to the appropriate ministry team. Requests from potential caregivers in the South Island area are sent to the Chatterton Way MCFD office. Requests from Nanaimo are sent to the local MCFD office. Other Central and Upper Island requests as well as the rest of BC are emailed to the Provincial Recruitment Team.

Recruitment on Facebook

We advertise the need for foster homes on our FPSS main Facebook page. We see a consistently strong number of recruitment views and many people registering for Foster Hope Information Session reporting that they learned about the need for foster homes online. FPSS is researching how we may best use digital marketing to increase awareness of the need for foster care homes.

The office receives phone calls and email requesting more detailed information and assistance with registration. A high percentage of those reaching out for more information register for a Foster Hope Information Session. We continually monitor the comments and questions on the recruitment ads. FPSS is continually developing new ads to promote fostering with many specialized ones targeting specific groups such as teens, and children and youth with support needs.

Current research is emphasizing the importance of creating belonging for children and youth in care. Children and Youth who have a sense of belonging (including in foster families) are more likely to be successful as they transition to independence.

In South Island, we have a private Facebook group for homes going through the process of becoming foster caregivers. This allows them to connect with their local peers. We hope to expand this to other communities across the Island.

Enhanced Communications among Caregivers

Foster Caregiver Support Mornings

Cowichan Valley Foster Parents Local and FPSS co-hosted two support sessions giving foster caregivers opportunities to connect and share about the unique challenges fostering can have. At the August gathering there was also a special free clothing event for foster families.

MCFD/Foster Caregiver Partnership

There were no partnership meetings held this quarter. Bi-monthly meetings are scheduled to resume in October.

Newsletters and Brochures

Printed copies of FPSS newsletters and brochures were available to foster caregivers and social workers at in-person events. I also shared our digital version of *The Island Connection* newsletter upon request.

Emails

This quarter I emailed 1,228 information flyers to those on my distribution lists. I had 72 individual email contacts about educational and social opportunities, resources, questions, and MCFD updates. Information and registration invite emails distributed using Constant Contact are not part of these email stats.

Foster Parent Facebook Group

FPSS Society manages a private Facebook site for Cowichan Valley foster caregivers. Foster caregivers can join to view updates, educational and community events, and to connect, support, and share with each other. FPSS had 546 views of their 58 non-recruitment social media posts.

Provision of Ongoing Training Opportunities

I hosted one regional workshop and one local workshop.

Communication Skills for Helping Relationship with Children and Youth (Regional Replay)

A recording of the February 2023 workshop by Clinical Counselor Ashleigh Martinflatt was available for replay registrants to view at their own pace during for a two-week period. The presenter explored basic and advanced communication skills such as caring confrontation, empathy, reflective feeling statements, and more.

Child Passenger Safety

Hailey Bergstrom Parker from BCAA Child Passenger Safety Program provided an in-person information session covering all types of child car seats, BC Laws, how to choose and use a child car seat, and how to correctly install child seats in vehicles. FPSS continued to offer free therapeutic books delivered to foster caregivers upon request.

I also shared community programs, educational opportunities, Cultural events, and various resources with foster caregivers.

Caregiver Peer Support Services

Supportive Contacts

I had 24 one-to-one connections with foster caregivers to support with various issues, concerns, or challenges. Support included transition planning, Cultural awareness and agility, communication, advocacy, roles and responsibilities, self care, grief and loss, and resources.

Foster Family Free Clothing Event

CVFP Local and FPSS hosted a special outdoor event with an abundance of free gently used clothing foster families could look through and take home.

Foster Family Treat Day

FPSS Society treated foster families to some sweet treats at the end of summer holidays.

Identification, Presentation and Management of Common Issues for Caregivers

I had 1,134 contacts with foster caregivers for support, retention, information sharing, and referrals. I had 143 contacts with MCFD and IFCS agency social workers. Lalum'utul' Smun'eem Child and Family Services uses a single email address that all their social workers can access. Emailing to this address counts as one contact even though a number of social workers view the email. Also not included in my stats are any emails sent via Constant Contact.

Cowichan Valley Foster Parent Local

CVFP Local is a small group of foster parents who are committed to enriching the lives of area foster caregivers. The Local had their AGM in June to review their service and elect a board for 2023/24. I had 63 contacts with the Local to discuss area fostering needs, explore ideas, and plan for events.

Continuous Quality Improvement

I reported most CQI administrative activities in my Nanaimo Coordinator report including timesheets, staff meetings, expense forms, general inquires, and health and safety reviews.

My Cowichan Valley CQI hours are for area specific documentation, submissions for The Island Newsletter, staff summaries, compiling stats, and reports.

Enhanced Communications among Caregivers

Foster Caregivers Support Mornings

Post summer holidays, one in-person support gathering occurred in September. Support Mornings are opportunities to connect and share with other foster caregivers who understand the unique challenges and rewards of fostering.

Partnership Meetings

MCFD Nanaimo Resources resumed their bi-monthly parentship meetings in September. The meeting had virtual and in-person options for participation. Discussion included MCFD staffing updates, FPSS Mentorship Program, October Caregiver Appreciation plans, emergency preparedness planning, and identifying area needs.

Newsletters and Brochures

Printed copies of FPSS newsletters and brochures were available to interested foster caregivers and social workers.

Emails

I sent 1,190 information emails to my distribution lists and had 133 individual emails contacts to share educational and social opportunities, online and in-person resources, answer questions, and provide MCFD updates.

I also used Constant Contact (CC) to schedule emails distribution for information and registration opportunities for trainings and events. Those CC email stats are not part of this report.

Foster Caregiver Facebook Groups

There are two private Foster Caregiver Facebook groups in the Central Island. MCFD and a foster caregiver manage the Nanaimo Foster Parent Facebook Group. FPSS manages the Parksville Foster Parent Facebook Group. Foster caregivers can join and access these groups to connect, support, and share with each other.

For the Nanaimo Facebook group, FPSS had 587 views of their 32 posts, and for the Parksville Facebook group, FPSS had 82 views of their 40 posts.

Provision of Ongoing Training Opportunities

There were two regional training opportunities offered this quarter.

Understanding ADHD

This virtual workshop focused on variations of ADHD and associated brain functioning, what living with ADHD is like, ways to maximize function and learning, and how medication works. Attendees appreciated and valued the useful tips and knowledge sharing of presenter Lori Nichols, RN, MS.

Consent

Consent is a life skill that should be practice long before it has anything to do with sex. FPSS covered the costs of foster caregivers to attend this virtual workshop presented by Certified Sexual Health Educator Kerri Isham.

Additional Education Opportunities

I continued to share relevant online resources and in-person training opportunities with foster caregivers. These included neurodiversity, gender diversity, mental health, regulation, and ADHD.

FPSS delivered therapeutic books to foster caregivers upon request.

Caregiver Peer Support Services

Supportive Contacts

I had 59 one-to one connections with foster caregivers to support them with various issues, concerns, or challenges including transition planning, Cultural agility, changes to policies and practices, advocacy, self-care, and mental health resources.

Social Events

FPSS Society treated foster families in Nanaimo and Parksville to some end of summer sweet treats.

Identification, Presentation and Management of Common Issues for Caregivers

I had 1,168 contacts with foster caregivers and contacts with MCFD and ICFSA 177 social workers.

I made 11 referrals that included MCFD, Representative for Children and Youth, Office of the Ombudsperson, BCFPA Insurance, Foster Parents Support Line, House of Friendship, and the After-Hours Crisis Line.

Continuous Quality Improvement

I was accountable through completion and submission of timesheets, staff summaries, expense and mileage forms, Health and Safety reviews and quizzes, and my Quarter Report. I sent area updates and events for our *The Island Connection* newsletters. When possible, I attended staff meetings. I worked in collaboration with other coordinators as needed. I did updates for my laptop, printer, and phone as they became available. I continued to pursue training relevant to my FPSS coordinator role.

Comox Valley Community Development

With a changeover in Local Coordinators, this quarter focused on getting settled into the role and making connections to community resources and partnerships.

Comox Valley Foster Parent Summer Meetup

Unfortunately, no caregivers were able to attend the summer meetup. We instead used the time to brainstorm for fall education and social events.

Comox Valley Partnership Meeting

The Comox Valley is moving toward a quarterly partnership meeting. Meetings will continue to be hybrid (virtual and in-person) and held in October, January, April, and July.

Peer Mentor Program

In the Comox Valley, informal Peer Mentorship has been in place for some time now. Established foster parents turn to each other for support as well as connecting with new caregivers at chit-chats and Safe Babies Caregiver meetings. There is an opportunity to ensure that new caregivers are being encouraged to attend events, connect to the local coordinator, and have space to connect with caregivers who have similar practices or ages.

Continuous Quality Improvement

The Comox Valley Coordinator participated in FPSS Society staff meetings and submitted activity and expense reports, and newsletter submissions as required.

The Comox Valley coordinator:

- Participated in some FPSS Society Staff meetings.
- Participated in FPSS Society Health and Safety Meetings when possible.
- Organized and participated in one Comox Valley Social Committee meeting.
- Organized and participated in many calls, coffee and texting sessions with Caregivers.
- Attended the BCFPA Conference in Surrey

Upper Island (Campbell River and North Island) 2nd Quarter Activity Summary

Campbell River Area and North Island Report

Enhanced Communication among Caregivers

The UI coordinator shared notices about network, workshops and support events with Campbell River area and North Island foster caregivers through email distribution lists and personal contacts. The coordinator communicated through email messages to 600 Upper Island contacts including foster caregivers, MCFD staff, community agencies and members of the public. The Campbell River Foster Parent and North Island Foster Family Facebook groups continued to be sources for communications about local peer groups and upcoming caregiver training posted by FPSS Society Regional Office staff. Of note, between July and September, Upper Island caregivers experienced service interruptions. Regional Office staff covered the local coordinator's services during her July vacation. Local Upper Island MCFD Resource team was reduced staffing vacancies for worker holidays, and, at the end of September, when the Ironwood office relocated to 2nd Floor 1334 Island Highway.

Caregiver Support Services Sessions

The UI coordinator had two one-on-one contacts with Campbell River caregivers that resulted in sharing brochures and application information for the spring 2024 Safe Babies Program with one caregiver, and with assisting another with agency referrals and information related to a CLBC eligible youth aging out of care.

North Island Foster Resource Worker

Cheryl Jorgenson took personal leave during this quarter. NICSS staff covered her calls during her absence and reported no contacts with caregivers.

Mentor program

The FPSS Society's Social Worker Orientation Video was shared with Campbell River and North Island Resource workers as part of promoting the reworked program. One Campbell River mentor participated in this fall's online training.

Provision of Peer Support

The Campbell River Resource Enhancement Counsellor arranged September's *Walk and Talk* event as a new way for caregivers to connect and practice self-care. Catherine led participants in five-minutes of "forest bathing" and reflection as part of a 1-hour trail walk. Taryn Corrie, CYMH team, hosted a *Sit & Snack* event on September 27th. Taryn encouraged caregivers to discuss self-care and mental health practices in their homes and to suggest topics for future workshops. Also in September, CRFPA hosted a peer-support coffee meeting in a caregiver's home.

Foster Family Picnic

CRFPA arranged August’s Annual Foster Community Picnic at Hagel Park. A team of foster caregivers donated time and purchased prizes for everyone to make the picnic more fun. FPSS society was pleased to participate and fund this annual event. The North Island community did not schedule stand-alone peer support or network events, but the picnic did provide caregivers the opportunity to offer and receive peer support.

Safe Babies Caregiver Support Services

On August 30th, FPSS Society Executive Director Dan Maline consulted with the Comox Valley and UI coordinators to determine the next steps in service provision to our Safe Babies Caregiving communities. In anticipation of Morgan Horner taking on the Upper Island Safe Babies coordinator’s role, the Upper Island’s list (Campbell River and North Island) of active Safe Babies Homes was updated in collaboration with two MCFD resource workers. Morgan received the list and contact information for CR and NI resource workers and ten caregivers were emailed a notice of impending changes. Neither communities offered in-person Safe Babies caregiver peer support sessions in this quarter.

Partnership Meetings Identification, Presentation and Management of Common Issues for Caregivers

Foster Parent/MCFD Partnership Meetings

September’s Campbell River partnership meeting provided an excellent opportunity to connect after a busy summer. The Acting Youth Team leader shared an update on the MCFD’s Youth Transitioning out of care extended services. The partnership welcomed the resource team’s new SPA and CYMH’s new IP clinician. As always, our dedicated caregivers raised questions about trends in provincial and local foster care practice that impact their work. Draft minutes of the meeting were circulated through our distribution list by the coordinator.

The North Island community did not schedule partnership meetings.

Campbell River Education Committee

The area coordinator and Catherine McCauley, CRFS REC, met in August to arrange foster caregiver workshops while the Campbell River education committee continued its hiatus. Former committee members (caregivers and MCFD) were contacted in August and expressed their interest in restarting the committee’s planning process, but meetings were put on hold until after the MCFD team settled into its new offices.

FPSS society’s September online workshops were promoted in the Upper Island area with participation from some caregivers.

Continuous Quality Improvement

At Dan Malone’s request, the Upper Island and Comox Valley coordinators connected on August 31st to help Jessica Humphries settle into her coordinator position.

The area coordinator participated in FPSS Society staff meetings and submitted the November-December newsletter draft, expense reports, event summaries, and other reports as required. She participated in regional virtual meetings on September 15th (FPSS AGM) and September 28th (V.I. Regional Partnership).

UI Coordinator Professional development:

Online Seminar: *Decoding Deliverability: Essential Strategies for Reaching the Inbox*, Constant Contact, Aug 24th, 1-hour.

Online course: Indigenous Canada, University of Alberta, Faculty of Native Studies. Explored the diverse histories and contemporary perspectives of Indigenous peoples living in Canada. Twelve modules including, unit tests, completed in approximately 21 hours.

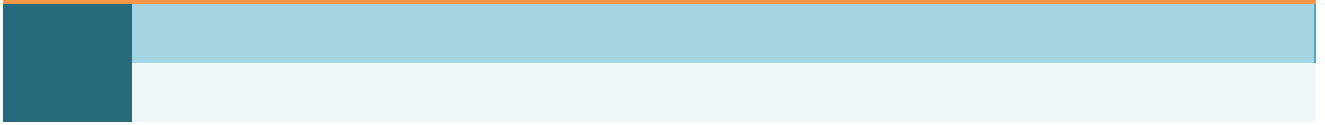
